Year 2 at the Grace Darling Museum in Bamburgh

Reception visited Hall Hill Farm near Lanchester in relation to their 'Living Things' theme studied in school. The children were excited to see everything farm life had to offer as they were given a guided tour of the site, during which they thoroughly enjoyed feeding the animals, especially the new born lambs. Back at school, the children were excited to watch the new chicks hatch, helping to take care of them as they grew.

Year 1 have been reading 'The Snail and the Whale' by Julia Donaldson in English. Linking to this, the children have studied a range of levers and mechanisms, looking at a range of existing products and evaluating them. The children then designed and made their own push and pull mechanism which was used to make the whale from the story move.

Year 2 visited the Grace Darling Memorial Museum in Bamburgh, linking to the their History study of the RNLI. The children were fascinated to learn more about Grace Darling's famous rescue of stranded sailors in the past and they carried out role play activities in costumes to get into the character's roles. On return to school, the children wrote biographies of Grace Darling as well as their own re-telling of her famous story.

Year 3 visited the Hatton Art Gallery linking to their Art unit on Collage. The children viewed a number of original pieces by the famous 20th Century artist Kurt Schwitters, including the large scale 'Merz Barn Wall.' The children then used the gallery's purpose-built art studio to make their own collages with a range of materials, taking inspiration from the pieces they had viewed around the gallery. Year 4 visited the Great North Museum in Newcastle linking to their Science unit on 'Living Things and their Habitats.' As part of the day, the children participated in an interactive workshop where they observed a range of animals in order to classify them into different groups based on their characteristics. The children also explored the different habitats and biomes located around the world, before returning to school where they furthered their understanding of how animals have adapted to survive in their specific environment.

Year 5 visited the Durham Heritage Coastline in relation to their Geography unit on 'Coasts.' The children examined first-hand coastal defences including a sea wall, gabions and riprap, as well the effects of coastal erosion such as the formation of a sea stack at Nose's Point and sea caves at Seaham. The children also carried out an investigation to measure longshore drift on the sea front. On return to school, the children further developed their understanding of coastal erosion, by identifying headlands and bays on a map of the Durham coastline that they had visited on the day.

Year 6 visited Roseberry Topping in North Yorkshire in relation to their Geography unit on 'Hills and Mountains.' Both classes successfully took on the challenge of climbing the iconic hill to its summit of 320 metres. Once at the top, the children were able to develop their compass reading skills to find famous landmarks visible in all directions. In school, Year 6 researched the formation of mountains as well as using atlases to locate the highest peaks nationally and internationally.
