Reception visited Stowell Street in Newcastle, where they enjoyed studying the Chinese gate and visiting the supermarket to buy some food and decorations for a celebration back in school. The children also enjoyed sharing fortune cookies and reading the messages inside. The Reception children also went to the nearby Discovery Museum, where they took part in a variety of exciting challenges in the Science Maze.

Year 1 visited 'Locomotion' at the National Railway Museum in Shildon. They enjoyed investigating locomotives ranging from the 1829 Sans Pareil to the 1970's Advanced Passenger. The children climbed into some of the locomotives and imagined what it might have been like to be the driver of a steam train.

Year 2 visited Sainsbury's in Sunderland where they were able to apply their understanding of money in a real-life context. The children enjoyed working on various maths problems in the supermarket and navigating their way around the aisles. The children then visited Seaham Harbour where they viewed 'The Coxswain,' a sculpture by Ray Lonsdale, in preparation for creating their own sculptures in the classroom.

Year 3 visited The Great North Museum in Newcastle linking to their Science unit, Animals Including Humans, where the children examined and identified different parts of the human skeleton. Both Year 3 classes also visited the Ancient Egyptian exhibition, where they were able to analyse a wide range of primary sources, including an mummified human, in order to develop their understanding of this ancient period in history.

Year 4 visited the Beacon of Light in Sunderland where they took part in a cookery workshop linked to health and well-being. As part of the day, the children engaged in a range of activities from Commando Joe's character education course to further develop their resilience, self-confidence and ability to work well as a team. The children also thoroughly enjoyed developing their culinary skills by learning how to prepare and cook chicken fajitas, which they then took delight in tasting.

Year 5 visited Newcastle Castle where they ventured into the depths of the dungeon to take part in a Tudor 'Crime and Punishment' workshop, before further investigating this area of history by stopping off at Bessie Surtees' House, a local example of Tudor architecture. Back at school, Year 5 continued their Tudor learning by studying different aspects of life in England at this time including crime and punishment, architecture and the impact of King Henry VIII's reign on the country.

Year 6 visited the fascinating Victoria Tunnel in the Ouseburn area of Newcastle. Although the tunnel was originally built to transport coal during the Victorian period, it was also used as an air-raid shelter during World War II. The children were given a guided tour of the tunnel, learning all about its amazing history before taking part in a workshop which was led by Marion, who lived through WWII as a child. On return to school, the children wrote a letter from the point of view of an evacuee child as well as report on how the tunnel was used during WWII.
